GENDER EQUITY, INDIGENOUS IDENTITY & CIVIC ENGAGEMENT



Across the political spectrum, Native women, Two-Spirit, and gender-expansive folks are key holders of Indigenous identity and drivers of civic engagement. The Indigenous Futures Survey 3.0, conducted in 2023, saw the following responses from participants who identified as cis and trans women, Two-Spirit, or gender-expansive/non-binary.

Native women (inclusive of cis and trans women) consistently prioritize Indigenous culture and identity in their daily lives.

Tribal Sovereignty:

The ability for Tribal Nations to govern, protect, and enhance the health, safety and well-being of their Tribal Citizens. Native women and gender-expansive folks believe that civic engagement is a key element of advancing Indigenous rights and Tribal sovereignty.

74%

believe that voting in Tribal elections is an effective way of improving the lives of people in their Tribal communities 71%

believe that voting in local, state, and national elections is an effective way to improve lives in Tribal communities

Native women and gender-expansive folks are politically engaged inside and outside the voting booth.

800/0 voted in their last state election

76% voted in their last local election 740/0 voted in the 2022 midterm election 50% voted in their last tribal election


